ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY/BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH	George Cornwall was born in Vancouver on September 13, 1908 and was educated in that city. He attended UBC from 1924 to 1931, first taking courses in economics and the humanities before obtaining a degree in Chemical Engineering. George's first summer in the wilds of British Columbia was in the Kingcome Valley in 1926, where he worked on a crew which was surveying agricultural land. He spent the next four summers working as an instrument man on During World War II he played a vital role conducting research on strategic metals production as part of Canada's war effort. He also spent a good part of his career working for the Toronto Star – developing a manufacturing plant for ink, as well as conducting research on paper.
